

COPYRIGHT NOTE FOR AUTHORS AND PUBLISHERS

General

All AQA publications (and those of its predecessors, The Northern Examining and Assessment Board, Associated Examining Board and the Southern Examining Group) - including, for example, syllabuses, past question papers, mark schemes, coursework guidelines and marking criteria and chief examiners' reports - are subject to copyright and may not normally be reproduced in whole or in part without the prior written consent of AQA.

AQA require a minimum of four working weeks to process the application and will take seriously publication of any AQA material without permission. Please note that during the summer months (June to late August) the examination process takes priority at AQA. In order to avoid delays it is strongly recommended that authors and publishers do not send requests for copyright permission to AQA at this time; *if this cannot be avoided, requests should be submitted earlier as they are likely to take a longer period to process.*

AQA will not allow questions to be reproduced before they are available on the AQA website, so a period of at least nine months should be allowed between the date of the examination and reproduction in a published work.

It is not possible to give permission for the reproduction of specimen questions as they have not been tested in a live examination situation and have not undergone the usual rigorous checking procedure. The only exception to this rule will be in the case of entirely new specifications where there is no other material available.

Publishers must send in copies of the questions/material they wish to use: this will speed up the checking process.

Question Papers and Mark Schemes

AQA will not grant blanket permission to authors or publishers to reproduce unspecified questions/schemes or complete question papers but will consider written requests relating to individual questions/schemes under the following conditions:

1. Questions may not be quoted in books which consist wholly or even mainly of exercises, questions and/or question papers.
2. Questions may not be altered in any way without prior authorisation from AQA. If amendments/adaptations are made then please indicate that this is the case and attach a copy of the amended version.
3. Where worked solutions to questions and/or commentaries on the questions or possible answers are provided, it must be made clear that the author is responsible for the solutions and that
 - (a) they have neither been provided nor approved by AQA.
 - (b) they may not necessarily constitute the only possible solutions.
4. Any permission given cannot and does not extend to any material within a question which is held in copyright by another body. (This is normally indicated on the examination paper.)
5. AQA does not normally grant permission for the reproduction of complete examination papers. Applications will be considered for permission to reproduce up to 50% of questions of an individual examination paper. In cases where exclusive contracts have been entered into with third parties, permission may be given to other applicants for up to 20% of an individual paper depending on the terms of the original agreement.
6. An acknowledgement of AQA's permission must be made in the published book and each individual question should be followed by the letters AQA or AQA(NEAB, AEB, SEG), as appropriate, together with the year of the examination from which the question is quoted. Any reference should quote the title "**Assessment and Qualifications Alliance**".
7. Requests made to AQA for permission to reproduce examination material must give precise details of the examination (e.g. GCSE, GCE, GNVQ), year, subject, syllabus/specification, paper, section and question number.

8. Requests made to AQA for permission to reproduce questions should state the title, author and publisher of the proposed publication as well as a brief description of the nature and scope of the publication.
9. Depending on the purpose to which AQA material is being put, AQA will determine an appropriate fee.
10. Publishers requiring permission to reproduce AQA material in a photocopiable resource pack or similar product are strongly advised to contact AQA at least six months before the date of publication, in order to negotiate fees and conditions. AQA will always make a charge for the use of such material to offset the loss of sales of past question papers, etc.
11. On publication, a complimentary copy of the textbook, journal or other publication in which AQA material appears should be sent to AQA, at its Manchester or Guildford Office.
12. AQA will not unreasonably withhold permission for the reproduction of questions and marking schemes provided that the above conditions are met, but does reserve the right to refuse permission without necessarily giving reasons for so doing.

Examiners' reports, specifications

13. AQA will allow brief extracts from examiners' reports, but reproduction of blocks of pages will not be allowed.
14. AQA does not encourage the use of extracts from specifications as these are liable to frequent review and the most current versions are placed on the AQA internet. Reproduction in print may therefore become out of date and possibly offer misleading information. It is not usually in the interests of candidates to have more than one source for specification details.
15. Requests to use text from both the above categories will usually be charged at the AQA standard rate unless there are multiple request for the same publication. Charges will then be at AQA's discretion but still within the £50-£100 limit.

Fees

The following fees have been introduced for requests to reproduce questions from AQA examination papers. The standard administrative charge will also apply to requests to reproduce brief extracts of text from specifications.

Standard administrative charge (to cover first 10 questions)	£50
11 – 25 questions	£15
26 – 50 questions	£25
51-75	+ £35
More than 75 questions	+ £50

An invoice for the appropriate amount will be issued with the permission contract.
 All invoices must be paid within 30 days.
 Payment must be made in pounds sterling.

Electronic Formats

16. AQA will permit material to be reproduced on standalone CD-ROM, subject to the conditions listed in paragraphs 1-11 above and also subject to the additional conditions below. This does not include CD-ROM site wide provision over an intranet.
 - (a) The Publisher will be required to maintain the integrity of the original item and to ensure that users of CD-ROMs are also advised to maintain the integrity of our material.

(b) The Publisher will be required to send to AQA a free copy of the CD-ROM.

17. AQA policy for the use of AQA material made available on a site-wide basis through CD-ROM is as follows:

- Use is restricted to 10% of the document in question, regardless of whether the material is covered by an exclusive arrangement.
- The charge for using the materials is double the standard rate for its use in hard copy publications.
- Permission is granted through a license for a period of 12 months from the license date, to be renewed annually.

18. AQA will **not** permit the reproduction of any copyright material in any other electronic format, such as the Internet, without the written approval of AQA. The current policy of AQA is not normally to grant such permissions.

19. AQA will accept requests for inclusion of material in eBooks under the following conditions:

- No editorial changes can be made to the eBook
- Users cannot alter/adapt or print the content of the eBook
- Users cannot resell or loan the eBook

20. Publishers should note that the use of the AQA logo and any reference to AQA-endorsement is only permitted within a contractual arrangement with AQA

Other Publications

10. AQA will also consider specific requests for the reproduction of extracts from its other published material, for example syllabuses and chief examiners' reports. This includes printed material, electronic material and video and audio tapes. As with question papers and mark schemes, details of the particular material for which release of copyright is sought should be given, in writing.

22. Authors and publishers may **not** reproduce any AQA materials, in whole or in part, without the prior written permission of AQA.
